

# ANNOUNCEMENTS



On Monday, 20th of March we will have school photos taken at school. Please use the envelopes to order online or in cash and return them to the classroom/homeroom teacher before or on photo day.

Prep students need to be in their full sports uniform. If your child still doesn't have a sports shirt, we will facilitate a swap with the spare uniforms.

Year 1-12 students need to be in full formal uniform, including black leather school shoes. Please follow the guidelines outlined in the student handbook, listed below.

### **Hairstyles**

Hair should be clean, neat and tidy.

Hair that touches the collar must be worn tied back, off the face.

Fringes and sides must be brushed or pinned back so that it does not obscure their face.

Hairstyles for boys and girls must be moderate - punk styles, undercuts, spikes, and wedges or other unusual lines or shapes cut into the hair are not permitted.

ALL hair should be tied with a navy, black or gold/yellow hair elastic or ribbon. Plain hair clips in the College colours may be worn. Headbands are to be in a single school colour - without flowers, sequins, lace or frilly designs.

### **Jewellery and Make-Up**

Jewellery, including bracelets, bands, chains, earrings, studs and rings, is not part of school uniform and should not be worn.

One small (2mm or less) PLAIN silver or gold stud or small sleeper will be permitted in each ear.

Band-Aid cover-ups are not allowed.

Make up should be used discreetly. Students will be asked to remove any visible make-up.




### PREP PARENTS

### AND HOW TO TREAT SPECIAL PLACES







Prep B have been learning about Connections of the First Australians to a local place. The children gained an understanding of why the 'Shell Middens' are important to the Yuibera Tribe living near Cape Hillsborough. The Shell Middens were described as a school, church, a meeting place, and it was safe. The children were cared for by their elders while their parents hunted for food along the shoreline using fish traps. They watched their parents from the ridge above the beach.

The class watched a short video then discussed how we care for a special place. We then made our own Shell Middens in the sandpit. Built a paddle pop fence around the exterior and had an icy pole placing our wrappers in the bin realising we need to pick up our rubbish if we visit a special place. After some fun we came back to class drawing our creations for a class display.


